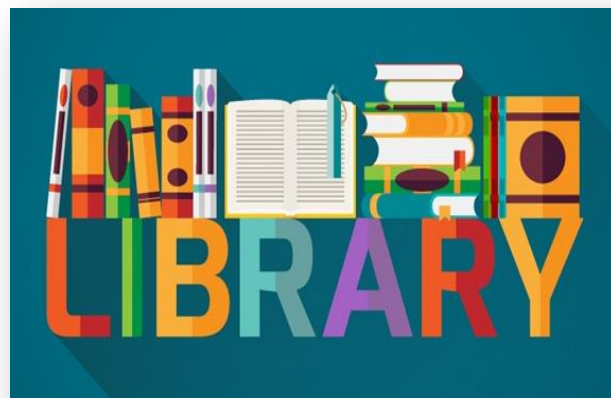

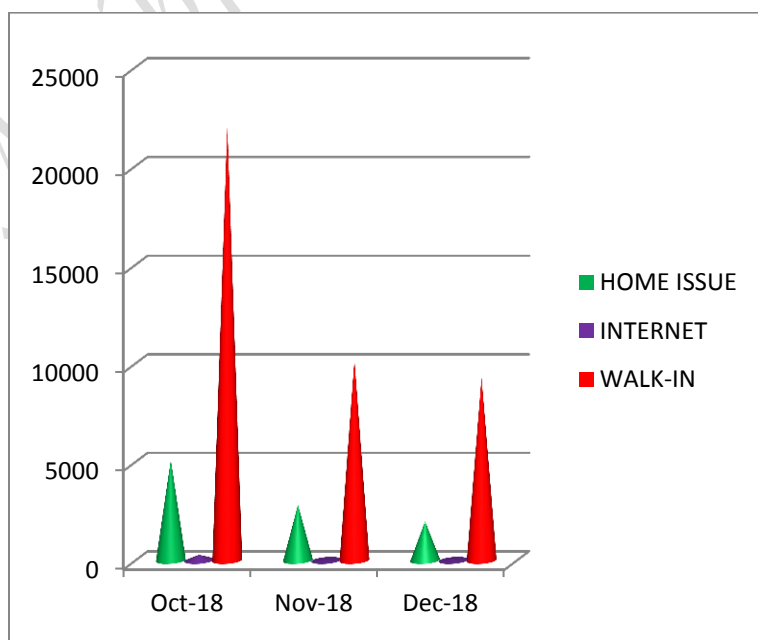

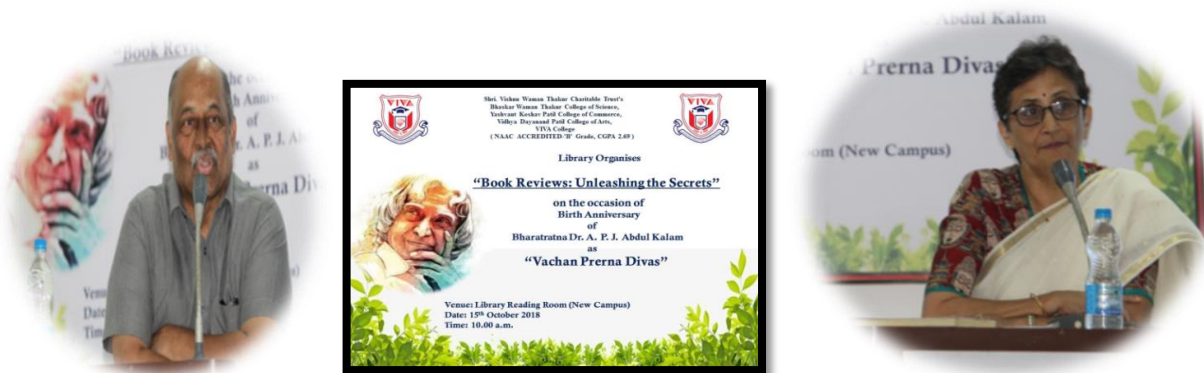
## Vachan Prerna Divas

## Staff Development Programme

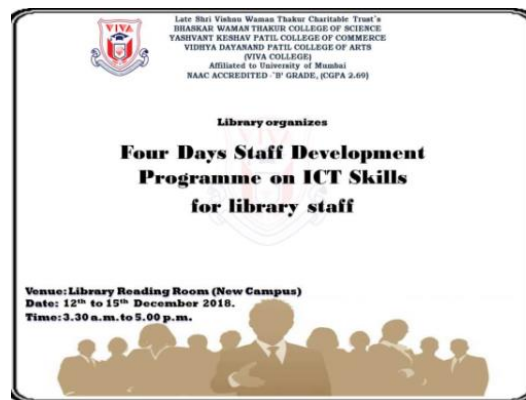
