Gender equity is emphasized, ensuring that girls and women are offered activities and programs tailored to their specific needs, interests, and experiences, which may include adaptations or entirely unique offerings.

The college places significant emphasis on holistic student development, focusing on both academic excellence and overall personality enhancement. To foster gender equality, special attention and facilities are provided to girls. The NCC unit for girls emphasizes character development, leadership skills, and camaraderie, celebrating their outstanding achievements. Similarly, the NSS unit encourages girls to fulfil their social responsibilities and provides amenities such as separate study rooms, waiting areas, and parking spaces. Additionally, girls benefit from self-defence training, as well as opportunities for rifle shooting, yoga, meditation, and various skill-building activities like ornament making, cloth bag production, and mushroom cultivation. Furthermore, the college organizes lectures by eminent personalities to further enrich girls' personalities and empower them to thrive.



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Other Facilities

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


Fig 1. Gender Wise Details of Total Students in College (UG) in year 2019-2020




Fig 2. Gender Wise Details of Total Students in College (PG) in year 2019-2020

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


Fig 3. Gender Wise Details of Total Students in College (UG) in year 2020-2021




Fig 3. Gender Wise Details of Total Students in College (UG) in year 2020-2021

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


Fig 5. Gender Wise Details of Total Students in College (UG) in year 2021-2022




Fig 6. Gender Wise Details of Total Students in College (PG) in year 2021-2022

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

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
